MONOGRAPHY

I. DEFINITION: Royal Spanish Academy GREEK:

Monos Unique Graphein = To describe

- a) Intellectual work
- b) Scientifically organised (method)
- c) Explores a topic in depth Descriptive, concrete
- d) Investigative nature / Experiential nature (Supervised practice)
- e) Structured (steps)
- f) Results are disclosed (feasible reflections, etc.)

Types of Monographs

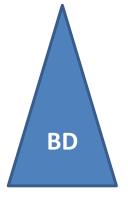
Compilation - refers to the critical analysis of existing literature on a topic to present different points of view and opinions. The emphasis is on the study of the literature. It is important to have a good level of understanding in order to refer to the different points of view and present your personal opinion after a thorough review.

Case Study - is the description of an experience that is compared with other similar experiences and finally a series of conclusions are presented.

Research - involves a series of steps in the search for and study of a problem, providing findings and recommendations for its solution from a new point of view.

3.- Research:

Based on a topic that has been little researched

Criterion: Make new contributions

A. Intellectual:

Requires physical and mental effort

B. Scientifically organised:

Use of science as a foundation

D. Research:

Involves: inquiring, discovering, revealing, finding out, searching, exploring through methodologies

Report discloses the results, using as a source the

STRUCTURE OF THE MONOGRAPHY

1.- PRESENTATION:

- a) Cover: Institution, Title, Author, Title "Biodanza Teacher", date of presentation
- b) Acknowledgements and/or Dedication
- c) Summary: 120 to 150 words, including the purpose or objective of the work, hypothesis, method and supporting theories, and general conclusion.
- d) General index: Location in the text
- e) Index of tables and figures

1. Introduction:

Conceptual and theoretical formulations—situates the reader in the problem.

2.- Theoretical framework:

Body of the work, foundation: set of ideas, laws, and theories proposed by the author as justification. Supports and argues the study's proposition.

- 3.- Study or research method
- Reports methodological aspects
- Use of instruments
- 4.- Analysis and treatment of information sources:
- Indicates background
- Similarities and differences with respect to the problem under study
- Analyse and discuss prudent theories

- 5.- Recommendations and Suggestions
- Within the conclusion.
- Summary of the research results.
- Questions arising from the research
- Aspects to consider in the future

MONOGRAPHY

- 6.- Bibliography, references and appendices:
- Identify sources (ISO 690)
- Support interpretations
- Appendices: these are supplementary to the text and should be interpreted.

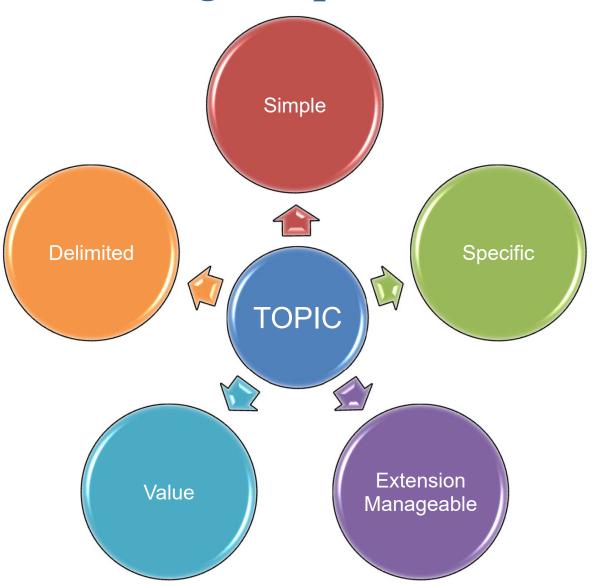

Steps for preparing a monograph.

- 1. Selecting a topic (What should I do?)
- 2. Searching for information (Where do I look?)
- 3. Reading and evaluating information (What is useful?)
- 4. Work plan (How do I do it?)
- 5. Completing the work (What do I write?)
- 6. Final draft of the work (Is it well written?)
- 7. Bibliography (Where does the information come from?)

IN BIODANZA....

Choosing a Topic



- The topic should be straightforward
- It should be specific and clearly defined
 - It should be of a manageable length
 - It is advisable for students to discuss the characteristics and value of their topic with their SUPERVISING Professor.

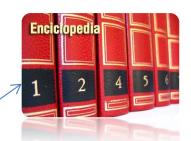

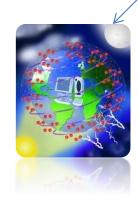

Information Search: Readings (What is it for?)

IN BIODANZA...

After selecting the professional literature we find on the topic we have decided to study, when reading it we must bear in mind the following:



- The objectives we pursue
- What is our approach?
- Is this reading relevant to my thesis?

Identify

- Similarities
- Differences
- Controversies

Reading and evaluating information

- Read carefully, keeping a dictionary close at hand to clarify any concepts you do not understand.
- Write down the information and data that you think may be useful for your work on a card or in a notebook.
 - Tips:
 - Write the bibliography of the readings on cards. This way, you will have the bibliography, possible citations, and annotations ready in advance.
 - Keeping the information on cards makes it easier to organise.
- Include specific citations that help give your work authority.



Work Plan

- Use an outline, concept map, or other means to help you visualise the topic.
- It is important that the medium you select guides you towards a logical and organised construction of the topic.
 - Advantages
 - It helps to organise ideas.
 - Gives direction to the work.

Work Plan (including written work sections)

Title Page (cover page, according to APA Manual)

- Pagination
 - The title page is page number 1 of the work, but the number is not printed.
- Required elements
 - Header
 - Name of the Biodanza School. Centred one inch from the top edge of the paper.
 - Title of the work
 - First letter capitalised, the rest in lower case. The title is centred.
 - Author
 - Follow the spelling rules for names. The name is centred after the title.
 - Class details
 - Date of submission of the assignment.
 - Name of the teacher

Work Plan (including written work components)

Title

 The title of the work should be written in upper and lower case letters, centred on the first line.

Introduction

- Here you should provide a brief description of the topic and the objectives of the work.
- It should immediately follow the title of the work.

Body or Content

- Here, the topic and objectives of the work are discussed in detail. Background information is presented, i.e. definition of concepts, historical background and secondary and tertiary subtopics (in order of importance).
- Pagination
 - The body of the work begins on a new page (page 3).
 - The subsections of the body of the work do not begin on new pages.

Work Plan (including written work components)

Conclusion

- Possible conclusions or answers to the research topic are outlined. This section contains the final impressions of the work and adds possible solutions or recommendations to the topic raised.
- This section contains the final impressions of the work and adds possible solutions to the problems raised.
- In cases where one or more hypotheses have been presented, it must be stated whether the original purpose(s) has/have been achieved.

Work Plan (including written work components)

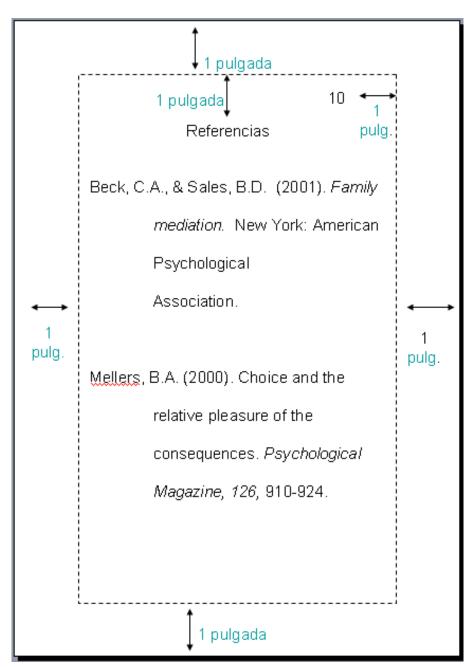
Bibliography

- In this section, we record, describe, and classify written and non-printed or electronic materials for a specific purpose.
- This includes all information resources consulted for the writing of the monograph.
- The use of a style guide is recommended.
- Pagination
 - The list of references or bibliography begins on a new page.
- Heading
 - The word References or Bibliography centred on the page.
- Format
 - All entries are organised in alphabetical order by the surname of the author(s).

Work Plan (including written work sections)

- Required elements for the bibliography, using the APA Manual.
 - Author
 - Publication date
 - Name of the book, journal or document
 - Volumes
 - Pages
 - Place of publication
 - Publisher
- Important
 - All names of books, magazines, and periodicals are italicised.

References or bibliography / webography

Work Plan

- Appendices
 - This is usually included after the bibliography.
 - Includes the documentation necessary to develop the selected topic.

Final draft of the paper.

 Write a draft of your paper to refine your writing. Remember that the draft should include the basic parts (introduction, body, conclusions, and bibliography).

 Document your work. To do this, you can use direct or indirect quotations.

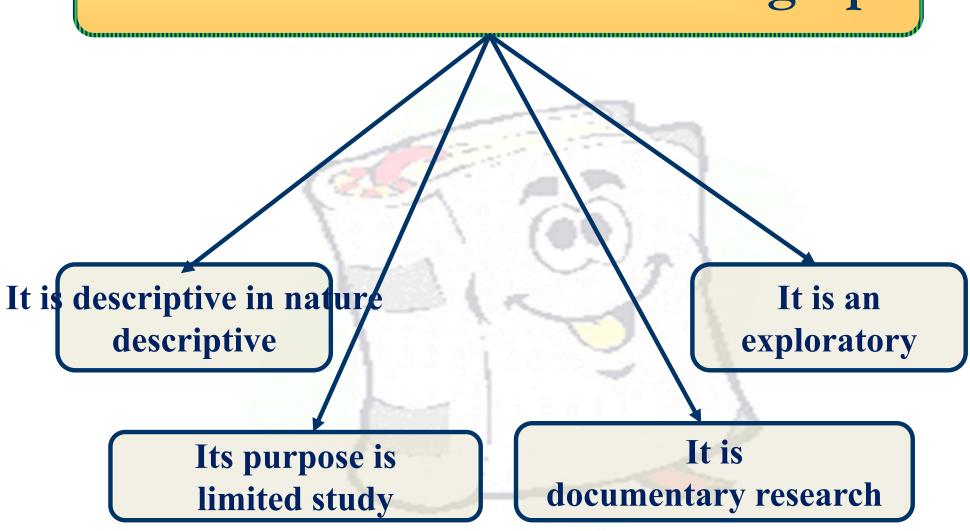

Stages of the Research Monographic

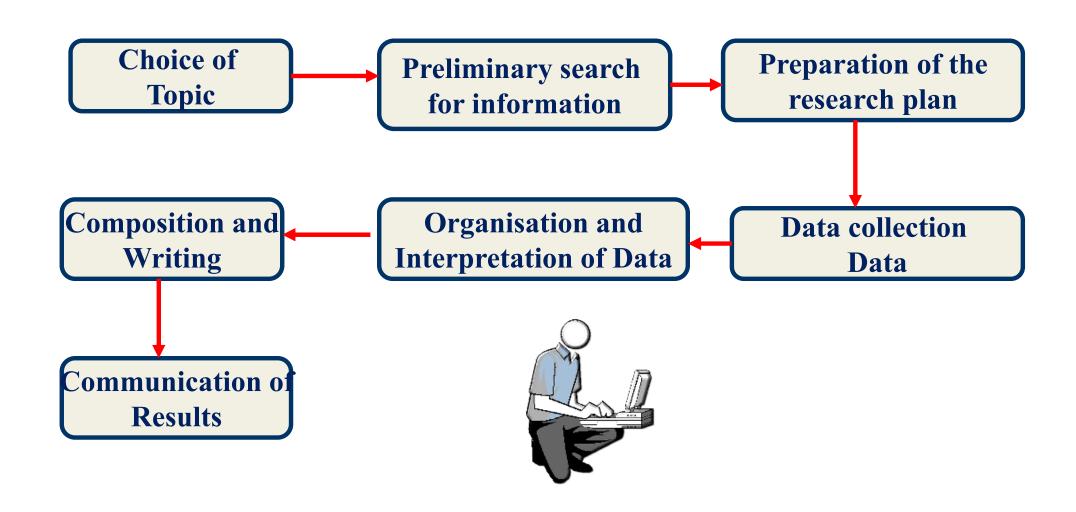
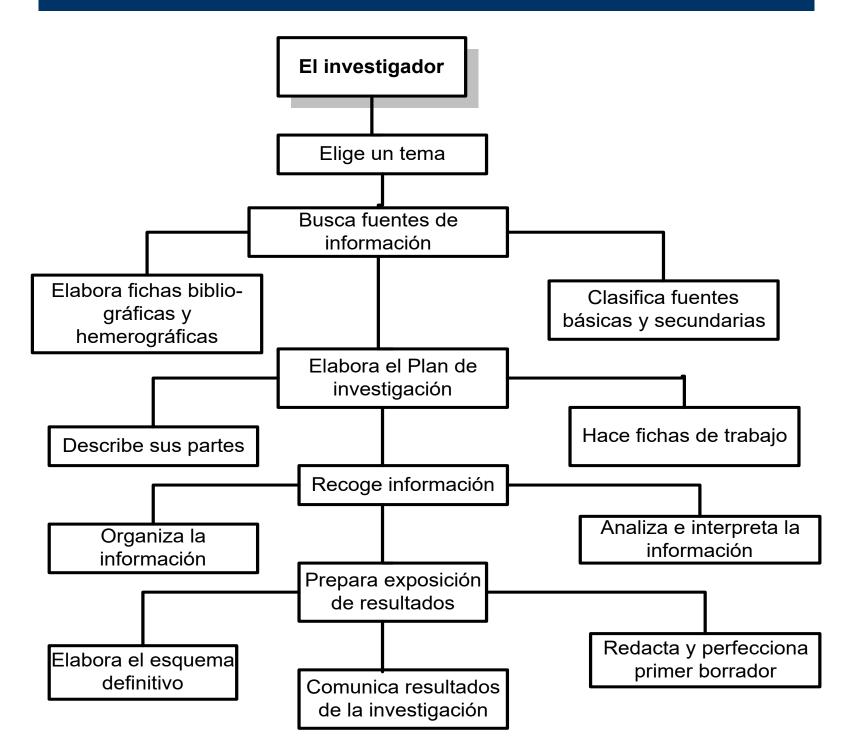


DIAGRAM OF THE MONOGRAPHIC RESEARCH





Preparation of the Research Plan

• With the information retrieved, we proceed to formulate an <u>outline</u>, which will serve as a guide for the search for new, more in-depth information.

• Plan Structure:

- **✓** Cover page
- ✓ Introduction (reference to objectives, importance, etc.)
- **✓ Body (Table of Contents)**
- ✓ Sources of Information (Bibliographic, Newspaper, electronic (list of those consulted up to that point have been consulted.



Data collection

- •This consists of gathering information
- •To this end, research sources are used
- •The filing technique is used



Organisation and Interpretation of data

- •This begins once the information has been collected.
- •The content of the research files is reviewed.
- •Qualitative and quantitative information is taken into account.
- •The files are classified and organised according to topic.



Composition and Writing

•After organising the information and before proceeding drafting the report, it is necessary to structure ideas (in a new outline).

The first draft is prepared according to the new outline

•The writing of the monograph must respect academic and technical language, as well as the rules of its construction.



Communication of results

- This means that after obtaining the research results research must be communicated to the Biodanza
- •The work must be presented in printed form and take into according consider aspects of form and content

For the development of the Monograph on PRACTICAL EXPERIENCE

EVERY monograph must have a chapter dedicated to the development of the practice, which must include an account of the eight supervised sessions.

- 1.- Introduction: The introduction consists of a brief description of Biodanza, including its definition and a reference to Rolando Toro Araneda, its creator, as well as a brief presentation of the monograph.
- 2.- Description of the group. (refer to how the group is constituted).
- a) Ages
- b) Gender (number of women and men participating in the group).
- c) Professions
- d) Expectations of the group participants
- e) Location where the work was carried out (describe the characteristics of the premises where the supervised classes were held).
- f) How it was formed.

Note: You should refer to the information provided by the group participants in the "Individual Followup Form for Participants in the Supervised Practice Group".
